Introduction

Your challenge is to help to spread the word about your unit, plus the fabulous things that you do as a Rainbow, Brownie, Guide, Ranger or volunteer with Girlguiding, so that other people can learn about it and maybe even join in the fun and adventure too.

You can work towards this challenge on your own or with other members of your unit. Please try to make sure that, if you are working on it as a group, everyone feels involved in what you are doing!

If you are a Rainbow, Brownie, Guide, Ranger or Young Leader then you MUST ALWAYS check with your unit's leader to make sure that what you are planning to do is safe. If you are an adult volunteer you might also want to let the rest of your unit leadership team know about any plans too ... the more the merrier with this badge.

Don't worry - to achieve this badge you don't need to do every single idea from the suggested list. It is suggested that Rainbows do at least 3 things, Brownies do at least 4 things and Guides/Rangers/young leaders/adult volunteers do at least 5 things to achieve this badge.

If you have another fabulous idea for how to promote your unit locally then do that too...

Parents of our young members as well as husbands, wives and partners of current volunteers can also earn a badge by completing at least 3 tasks!



Things that you can do near where you live

Design an eye-catching poster about your child's/wife's/partner's/husband's unit and put it in the window of your/a friend's/family member's car (remember that they need to see out of the window still).

Things that you could do with a relative's unit

Go along to help out at your daughter's/wife's/partner's/husband's unit for at least one of their regular meetings.

Set up a public facing Facebook/twitter account and regularly share news about fabulous events/opportunities in Girlguiding.

Staying safe while taking part in this challenge ... advice mainly for children but important for adults too

Personal details

You should never share your personal details with strangers.

Don't include things like your full name, where you live, what time your unit meets.

Check your plans with an adult before you do anything for this challenge.

Internet safety

Don't share personal information like your name, address or phone number. If anything worries you, tell someone you trust, like a parent/carer or leader. Get permission from your parent/carer before you go online. Get permission from your parent/carer before downloading anything. Only add people, on sites, who you are friends with in real life.

Out and about

Pay attention to what is happening around you. Only do your activity when you are somewhere safe.

Stay a safe distance away from roads and other hazards. Stay with an adult if possible.

Always make sure that you are correctly dressed for the weather!

When out in the sun, remember to wear sun cream, a sunhat and sunglasses.

Always keep to the Green Cross Code and remember to wear reflective or bright clothes/accessories so that cars and bicycles can see you.
